Retention

Our District has lost 78 members in the first five months of our year. Research shows that 50% of new members drop out within the first three years. All of our clubs are having problems keeping members. Retention is a challenge for our clubs. Members drop out for many reasons. Many leave due to employment, moving, illness and death. This we know cannot be helped. But many leave because they feel they are not needed, meetings are boring, club cliques, lack of enthusiasm and lack of goals.

We can turn this decrease around by reminding our members what we are all about. One of the most important thing that needs to be done is orientation as soon as possible for the new members. Do an assessment of your club to find out if there are any problems that you do not know about. People join the Lions for many reason, but the main reason is volunteering their time to help those that are in need. If members feel that their contributions are not needed or valued they will leave.

What can we do as Lions? We can make sure that new members are warmly welcome. Encourage all members to voice their opinions. Encourage those members that are uncomfortable talking to speak up. Make sure that your club knows the goals of the club. Make sure to listen to your members. Treat all members as equals. When brainstorming new ideas remember that no idea is a bad one. Club officers should not show favoritism to individuals. Make sure you communicate constantly with your members. This can be done by email, facebook, web site, texting and talking. Always talk to the member that wants to leave to find out why. You may be able to resolve the reason why the member is leaving.

If there is a conflict in the club you need to fix it quickly. Even the strongest clubs has conflicts from time to time. You do not want the conflict to go on too long.

I feel that we all needed reminded on how to help us keep members and I hope this will be a help.

Seneca County Project Lifesaver received a \$1,000 grant from the North Central Electric Cooperative People Fund to assist in the funding for equipment and supplies for a program that helps locate missing people with special needs.

Steve Fruth, secretary of the North Central Electric People Fund, presented the check to Seneca County Sheriff William Eckelberry, and Martha Senn and Cynthia Beat of Seneca County Project Lifesaver at the Seneca County Jail Wednesday night.

"We would like to thank the North Central Electric People Fund. This grant puts us closer to ordering the equipment needed," said Cynthia Beat, president of Seneca County Lifesaver during the organization's monthly meeting.

"Working Together to Bring Loved Ones Home" is the goal of Seneca County Project Lifesaver. The program works by having clients wear a small transmitter that emits an individualized tracking signal. If a client goes missing, the Seneca County Sheriff's Office is notified immediately. This international program is a pioneer in applying tracking technology for the search and rescue of individuals with cognitive disorders.

Project Lifesaver is supported by the Seneca County Lions Clubs of Attica, Bascom, Bloomville, Fostoria, Old Fort, Republic and Tiffin. For more information on Seneca County Project Lifesaver, contact Eckelberry at 419-447-8205 or Cynthia Beat at 419-937-7543.

North Central's People Fund raises funds each month through a program called Operation RoundUp. Cooperative members voluntarily round up their electric bills to the next whole dollar. Over 500 grants have been issued since 1999 to organizations and individuals in the North Central Electric service area. The cooperative serves members in Seneca, Crawford, Wyandot, Hancock, Huron, Richland, Sandusky and Wood counties.




