Statistics for the Summer of 2015

Camp Echoing Hills served 23 children during Lions Children's week and 51 teens during Lions Teen Week. Total attendance of our seven weeks of camp was 370, averaging about 52 campers per week. We also served more than 100 individuals throughout the state through our Camp in Motion program. The total number of campers served this summer was over 400.

The Lions Clubs of Ohio generously donated \$32,404.15 (an addition to \$7,671.67 left over from the previous year) toward Lions Camperships Summer Camp. The amount of campership dollars awarded for the summer was \$36,777.87.We were able to support 69 campers and 52 campers with full and partial camperships with undesignated Lions funds. In addition, we used \$275 for families who could not afford to pay the application fee of \$70. The total amount of Lions money awarded for the 2015 summer was \$37,052.87. Out of the remaining \$3,022.95, Camp Echoing Hills would like to designate \$2,000 to provide Lions camperships to Respite campers and \$250 for Lions camp participation fees.

Highlights from Camp Echoing Hills 2015

This summer's theme was Boldly Go; it was created to help our campers realize they have a responsibility once they accept Jesus into their lives to share Him with others. Many of our campers are able to gain more confidence in sharing Christ's love when they realize that God has a plan for EVERYONE in his kingdom, and that His plan includes them!

Our campers enjoyed daily activities such as go-cart rides, paintball, fishing, and visiting the nature center. They participated in a number of events such as the Talent Show, Kangaroo Court, a Luau and our new pool for swim time! During evening services, our campers were blessed through music, drama, and many great speakers.

Dates and Rates for Summer Camp 2016

The dates for 2016 Summer Camp: Lions Children's Week will be, June 26- July I and Lions Teen Week will be, July 10 - July 15. The rates for camp will be \$800.00. Registration fee will be \$70.00. The registration deadline is March 1, 2016. The registration fee is nonrefundable and we request that Clubs encourage parents to pay this fee. This tuition fee is refundable only if cancellation is made within 30 days prior to the beginning of the selected week of camp.

The date for our Lion's workday will be May 16, 2015.

Printing and Mailing of Lions Camp Materials

The following are the approximate costs for printing and mailing the materials that are distributed to clubs to inform them about Lions Sponsored Camp Weeks at Camp Echoing Hills.

2,500 brochures and 25 cover letters COST: \$750.00. Fifty copies of the brochure and a cover letter will be sent to each youth committee member to be distributed to clubs in their district. Each member of the committee will be responsible for distributing the material to his or her respective club.

Due in large part the generosity and continued compassion of the Lions Clubs of Ohio, Summer 2015 proved another wonderful year for Camp Echoing Hills. More than 60 individuals were able to experience a week of independence, friendship, and fun because of Lions Camperships.

A number of families stated that without the generosity of the Lions, their child would be unable to attend camp. Their appreciation went beyond verbal expression as their faces filled with joy at seeing their child experience a fun, empowering week designed just for them. They expressed relief at knowing their children would be safe and have all their unique needs met. The week also affords families a week of rest and relaxation from the challenges of providing physical care and emotional support to their very special children.
