Sauerkraut Soup Ala Pete

I cup diced potatoes 1/2 cup diced carrot 1/2 cup chopped onion 1/2 cup chopped green pepper About 3 1/2 cups sauerkraut, drained and soaked in cold water, squeeze out water 2 cans beef broth (you need more than this) Salt and pepper to taste 4 cups tomato juice (V-8 juice is better) 2 pounds kielbasa, cut very small 1/2 pound pepperoni

Cook kielbasa and pepperoni separately so soup will not be greasy.

You can add what you like to this soup, it is hard to spoil it. A few tings I add are a little soy sauce, any kind of meat--if you have a roast and gravy, put it in. I do not like bitter sauerkraut, so I add sugar.

Combine all this--mix well--simmer covered for one hour or longer. The longer you cook it the better it gets. Use your imagination!!

This is an excellent soup on New Year's Eve. It seems to sober people or maybe it adds to their tolerance.
