A centennial year of service! Lions Clubs International is topping off our centennial celebration at the 2017 International Convention in Chicago. With convention so close, the Ohio Lions are aiming to make a great showing this year.

For those wanting to attend, Registrations for International Convention are available online at <a href="http://lcicon.lionsclubs.org/">http://lcicon.lionsclubs.org/</a>. The Ohio Lions delegation is slotted for the Hilton Palmer House hotel, right across from the Chicago Art Institute.

District OH-2 has chartered a bus for those wanting to travel together. The bus will leave June 30 starting at 8 am and return July 5 in the late afternoon. It will pick-up in **Fostoria**, **Tiffin**, **Ashland** and **Port Clinton** - times and locations to be announced in early June. Once we get to Chicago, the bus will provide transportation to all of the International and Ohio events each day.

Those wanting to take the bus should send their registration form to <u>Lion Kerry Parker</u>, <u>121 Brookvalley Dr. Elyria</u>, <u>OH 44035</u>. This is a group registration to ensure that we are all in the same hotel. Registration paperwork must be sent with all necessary fees in the form of cash, check or money order, made payable to <u>Ohio Lions OH2</u>.

Registration fees for International Convention are \$130 + a \$200 deposit per hotel room. The bus fee is \$150, with a \$10 discount good through November 1. When registering, all fees are due.

Bus travelers should get their registration in by **NOVEMBER I** so that our housing will all be together. The longer we wait to register, the higher the chance that we will be separated. Registration for International Convention goes through April, but there are registration fee increases in January and in March.

#### **Five Rules to More Effective Projects!**

Every Lion wants to maximize the impact of his or her volunteer time. After all; we all joined Lions to do what needs to be done. Over the years I have met hundreds of Lions, visited scores of clubs; and the most effective Lion's projects follow 5 rules that make them successful.

- **I. Make a Road Map**: Planning is the precursor to success; without a clear and logical plan of action, the optimal result is difficult to achieve. Start with your goal and then break the project down into intermediate steps. Make sure you put everything on a time line. There is never a straight line between your goal and a successful conclusion to your project, so make sure you put in some intermediate goals to measure your progress along the way.
- 2. Enlarge the Circle: The more people that you recruit to help you with your project, the more likely it will be a success. Additionally, involving more members in your project will strengthen your club. However, you should be aware that a personal invitation to help is by far the best way to bring other members into your circle. Ask each recruit to do a part of the task. How many times have you been at a meeting where the president asks for volunteers and no one comes forward? Avoid that trap! Line up your key people in advance, and fill out your committees at meetings.
- 3. Communicate & Never Assume: There is nothing that beats talking with someone. E-mail & text are essential tools these days (so make sure you answer them promptly), but nothing beats conversation. Meet face to face with each member of your circle regularly; speak with them on the telephone, and engage them as you would a partner. Never assume that anyone understands, until they understand. Never assume that something has been done until you verify its completion.
- **4. Follow Through & Keep Moving:** Keep your project on the front burner. Talk about it at club meetings; keep checking your road map and time line. Solve problems as they come up, and never let them fester. The longer you allow problems to go unsolved the more difficult they become. Do not allow the project to stop; it will be hard to get it moving again.
- **5. Spread the Credit Around:** As the leader, you need to make sure your circle of fellow Lions and your club receive credit when the project is complete. Be generous with praise, and proud of what has been accomplished. Small awards and public recognition go a very long way to making successful projects.






