I have been reviewing the district membership reports that are generated each month. These reports are still showing members being dropped for nonpayment of dues. Clubs



are being billed for membership totals shown on the June 30 and December 31 report totals. This means the members that have not paid their dues by that date causes the club to pay their dues and assume the loss. Clubs need to revise the dues billing so they will have been paid by the end of June and December. Member dues not paid by that date should be dropped. Members can be reinstated up to six month from that date and still retain membership without having to pay the new member fees. The new Governor in July will not see members being dropped that should have been deleted from the membership totals in June or December.

The LCI website should be used by all club members as it contains a wealth of information. To use the web site, key in your member number as the user name. Your member number it is on the Lion magazine or your membership card generated from the Lions International club data base. Below the "submit or cancel input" you may select "new user" line. This will bring up the information page that you need to fill out to establish a password and sign on to the website.

VISION CLINIC OPENS AT LORAIN COUNTY HEALTH & DENTISTRY

Lions Clubs Dedicate Vision Clinic after Raising \$257, 000 for Equipment

Lorain – Lorain County Health & Dentistry, the county's largest safety-net provider of primary medical and dental care, has opened a full-time vision service at its 1205 Broadway location in Lorain. Years of planning by the health center and successful fund-raising, led by local Lions clubs, made the vision service a reality. "Many optometrists struggle to find a place to refer patients with no ability to pay for ongoing eye care. The LCH&D eye clinic will help so many people with their vision and medical eye conditions, and eye glass needs," said Optometrist John R. Smith, OD, a Lorain Lion and project leader.

Representatives from 56 Lions clubs in north central Ohio will join with Lorain County Health & Dentistry at 1205 Broadway in Lorain to dedicate the new vision clinic they helped to equip by raising \$257,000 for the project. Funds raised have been used to purchase state-of-the-art optometric equipment for the diagnosis and treatment of patients of all ages.

An open house for the general public will be held on Saturday, November 16, from 11:00 am to 1:00 pm at Lorain County Health & Dentistry, 1205 Broadway. All are welcome to attend and tours of the new vision clinic, and other health center clinics, will be given. Lions and LCH&D will also host a private dedication ceremony to honor Lions and special guests.

"Joining forces with the Lions made our vision clinic possible. The Lions mission to improve sight and prevent blindness perfectly matched our interest in improving access to vision care for those we serve. Their fund-raising efforts are second to none. We couldn't have opened this vision clinic without their help and support," said Stephanie Wiersma, LCH&D President & CEO.

The vision clinic has had broad support from Lions Clubs in the 10-county district. "A project of this scope requires the help of many. A hard-working committee of Lions from around north central Ohio has been involved for the past two years", said Ken Cromer, Lorain Lions Past President and project chair. John Donley, District 13-B LCIF Chairman noted, "This project exemplifies the motto of Lions "We Serve.' Now the uninsured and underinsured residents of the District will have access to affordable eye care."

Funds raised included grants awarded from the Lions Clubs International Foundation (\$75,000), Nord Family Foundation (\$50,000) and Community Foundation of Lorain County (\$43,450). \$90,000 in donations was received from Lions clubs and Lion members as well as private individuals and area businesses.

Since 2002, Lorain County Health & Dentistry, a Federally Qualified Health Center, has provided top quality health care to people of Lorain County, Ohio and surrounding areas regardless of ability to pay. LCH&D also offers prenatal/women's health care, pediatrics, family medicine, podiatry, asthma/allergy services, and general dentistry and operates three locations in Lorain and Elyria.

Lions clubs throughout the world have focused on the prevention of blindness and assisting persons with visual impairments since 1925 when Helen Keller spoke to the Lions Clubs International convention in Cedar Point, Sandusky, Ohio. Ms. Keller challenged Lions to become "Knights of the Blind" and that has become the core mission of Lions everywhere.



Vision Clinic Collaboration Frequently Asked Questions

1. What is the Lions and Lorain County Health & Dentistry Vision Clinic Collaboration?

The Vision Clinic Collaboration represents a collaboration between the 56 Lions Clubs, Ohio District 13-B and Lorain County Health & Dentistry (LCH&D). The Lions Clubs raised more than \$257,000 required to equip the new vision clinic with state-of-the-art optometric and diagnostic equipment. LCH&D constructed a 1,100SF vision clinic on the first floor of its new health center building at 1205 Broadway in Lorain, Ohio. LCH&D has purchased waiting room furniture, business office equipment and dispensary shelving for eyeglasses. LCH&D is responsible for all vision clinic operations.

2. Why did Lions Clubs and Lorain County Health & Dentistry collaborate?

Lions had a desire to make a meaningful and lasting impact on the broader community consistent with their mission. LCH&D observed the medical need and desired to open a vision clinic to address it, but was lacking adequate funds.

The need was made apparent in a 2011 survey of 568 LCH&D patients and visitors in which 33 percent reported never having been to an eye doctor. Of these, 65 percent cited as reasons cost, lack of insurance or a doctor who didn't take Medicaid.

The top medical diagnoses of LCH&D medical patients are diabetes and hypertension. This, plus the racial, ethnic and economic demographics of the user population, underscores the importance of having accessible, affordable vision services at LCH&D.

Working together, the two organizations will prevent blindness and preserve sight for those most in need for many years to come.

3. Where will the vision clinic be located?

The vision clinic is located at LCH&D's main health center location at 1205 Broadway in Lorain, Ohio. Pediatrics, prenatal/women's health, asthma/allergy services and general dentistry are also located at the main health center.

4. Who may use the services of the vision clinic?

Persons of all ages in need of primary and preventative eye care, including prescription glasses, may access care at LCH&D. Many are LCH&D medical or dental patients, and will enjoy the convenience of an additional service in a familiar setting. Those seeking eye care who are new to LCH&D are encouraged to learn about the health center's other services in Lorain and Elyria. There is no residency requirement to access health care at LCH&D; people residing outside of Lorain County are eligible to be seen.

The Health Center accepts Medicaid, Medicaid Managed Care, Medicare and most private insurances. LCH&D also serves those who do not have insurance, and discounts fees for eligible patients according to Federal Poverty Guidelines. LCH&D is committed to providing services to all those in need regardless of ability to pay.

5. How were funds raised to purchase the clinical equipment for the vision clinic?

Of the total funds raised (\$257,000), \$89,000 came from Lions Clubs and individual Lions through fundraisers, individual donations and donations from community members and businesses. In addition, Lions Clubs International Foundation awarded the project a \$75,000 grant (the largest allowable amount), the Nord Family Foundation \$50,000, and the Community Foundation of Lorain County \$43,450 (which was directly to LCH&D).

6. When will the vision clinic open?

The vision clinic opened on October 10, 2013 at the health center's new facility at 1205 Broadway in Lorain.

7. How many patients are treated at LCH&D? What volume do you expect at the Vision Clinic?

In 2012, LCH&D treated almost 11,000 unduplicated patients in 32,000 medical and dental visits. Of these patients, 29 percent were uninsured, and 82 percent had incomes at or below 100 percent of the Federal Poverty Level (earning about \$23,000 annually for a family of four).

The vision clinic at LCH&D is expected to generate about 2,500 patient visits in the first full year. This figure will increase to just over 3,000 visits the following year and will reach 3,500 visits by Year 4, and every year thereafter.

8. How will Lions be involved with the vision clinic now that it has opened?

The 56 clubs of Lions District 13B will not only continue to provide free eye exams and eyeglasses for individuals referred to them who are in need, but will also provide free transportation as a volunteer service for those individuals who need medical diagnosis and treatment for eye diseases and conditions, as necessary, at the new vision clinic at Lorain County Health & Dentistry in Lorain, Ohio. Optometrists who are members of Lions Clubs in District 13-B will serve on a medical advisory board to provide professional feedback on the services offered through the vision clinic. They will also assist in the ongoing evaluation of the vision program, including contributing to the study and review of relevant clinical outcomes, and other quality improvement initiatives.



Butler


