### Ohio Lions Foundation Disaster Relief

The Village of Bellville experienced a flood February 2011 and it affected 100 homes and many businesses.

The Bellville Lions Club wanted to help the victims but was not sure how to apply for Ohio Lions Foundation disaster funds.

The Club found the procedure easy. The first thing to do is meet with your local officials, such as the mayor, trustees or commissioners to assess the damage. When you know the approximate number September Visitations people needing help, contact OLF Trustee, PCC Stan Kopp.

You will need the name of the local club 11th and a contact person to administer the  $12^{th}$ grant. You also will need an estimate of 15th damage, the number of families effected 16th Zone 5 Meeting and the amount of funds required.

The OLF Disaster Relief Procedures and forms are available on the OFL website.

They have found that one efficient method of distributing grant funds is through the use of Kroger gift cards with our restrictive label attached.

You do need to take as many pictures or/ and news paper articles to show the need in your area. The OLF requires them for their records.

When Bellville was flooded, the Bellville Club made a decision to use their local market. The mayor had flyers placed on all of the homes that were affected explaining where to go and what was needed to apply for the funds. The local Neighborhood Outreach Center allowed the club to set up there for several days. Each victim of the flood filled out a short application asking for all of the household members, address, what was lost, and what was needed the most.
