# "Service thru Leadership" Ohio Lions Global Leadership Team Regional Lions Leadership Institute

The MD13 GLT will once again be offering a Regional Lions Leadership Institute to the Lions of Ohio. Levels I and II will be limited to 30 participants. Level III will be limited to 15 participants.

The Lions Institutes are indeed the "Ivy League" of leadership training. The institute at all levels will be a three-day immersion into developing and improving your leadership skills. This training will not only help you in your work with Lions, but also in your profession and your life.

This institute is designed solely to enhance your leadership skills. It will not be about fund raising, membership, or service projects. It will be held at the Deer Creek State Park Lodge, Mt. Sterling, Ohio, October 26-28, 2018. Attendance is required for all three days.

The cost to participants is \$160.00. The total institute cost per participant is over \$300. However, grants from LCI and funds from the MD12 GLT committee allow you to attend for about half of the institute cost. Your only other expenses will be your incidentals and transportation to and from. Your ho tel room, two dinners and three lunches will be paid in full by MD13 GLT.

Registrations will be handled on a first come/first served basis. We urge you to submit your application as soon as possible to guarantee that you have reserved your spot. All registrations are due by September 1, 2018.
