As you read this I am somewhere between Hayesville, Ohio and Milan, Italy. I begin this Lions year and my governorship with high expectations and even higher objectives. I find myself surrounded by a large group of very enthusiastic Lions who want to make a difference in their communities and this organization. I believe we can achieve amazing things through working as a team at the community, district, national and worldwide levels and Lions Clubs are the best forum in which to accomplish these amazing services. To accomplish great things we must begin by evaluating were we are. Each year you accomplish a great deal, but each year there are fewer of you, and in turn you accomplish fewer tasks. Our membership is aging and we are failing to refresh our ranks with an adequate number of younger members. It is time for this organization to say this must change, but to be a reality each and everyone of us must commit to the change.

This organization and this district have a great history and a strong tradition of service. However, as the saying goes "There is a reason the rear view mirror is small and the windshield so much bigger". As Lions we need to look out the windshield at the big and bright future. What I see all too often is people unwilling to make the one sacrifice necessary to reach that future. They refuse to leave the past behind. I have repeatedly heard members complain about the additional focuses of LCI, we have added to our mission of preventing blindness by including diabetes, and childhood cancer. Some think that an organization of I.47 million people should only have one focus. Keep in mind that it was not until 9 years after our founding that Hellen Keller challenged us, what if we had not decided to add to our mission of improving our communities? If we are to increase our membership, we need a bigger tent. We need to embrace the needs and objectives of others. In no small part because of our success, blindness is not as common as it once was and now younger people see other needs they want to help cure. We should embrace the opportunity to be more to our communities than we already are. We say, "Where there is a need there is a Lion", well there is a whole world of need besides blindness.

Some long time members think that their activities or the way they do the activity is the only way to do it. They don't allow for even the investigation of new ideas, new activities or new methods. Even though there is the potential opportunity for improving our service, or our activities. The absolute worst thing I have heard of is long time members saying they will not participate if things are changed. This goes against the very core values of Lionism, that it is about the service not ourselves and that our strength is in team work and unity. These people have lost sight of what being a Lion is all about.

In business, it is said that if you are doing the same thing you were doing five years ago you are going backwards, but some Lions won't consider rethinking their 30 year old programs! One tough concept to grasp is simply adjusting for inflation, if you gave \$25 to a cause in 1990 today, it is now worth \$12.50. So, if you are not giving that cause \$50 in 2019, you have considerably reduced the value of your donation. Many of our activities have not grown with time and the return on the investment, particularly time, is not there. Younger people have a lot of options for their time if they do not see a value worthy of their time and effort they are not going to participate.

I have no doubt we will have a fantastic year, because each and every member of this district wants something better for their club and community. Together we can accomplish so much. 

Whether you are beginning your journey into leadership or looking for a great refresher of the fundamental principles of leadership, this book that belongs at the top of your "to read list!" Where the "Extreme Ownership" book I reviewed in May teaches higher levels of leadership, "2.0" teaches the basics of what quality leadership is.






