I have said many times how exciting and inspiring it is to see all the projects that your clubs do for your communities. You should be very proud of what you accomplish every year. I want to ask you as a leader in your club (if you are reading this, you're a leader whether you like it or not) are there services that we are not providing our communities or individuals with in them? As Lions we like to say, "Where there is a need there is a Lion"! Are you living up to that lofty goal in your community? During the past Zone Meeting you brain stormed ideas for new service projects, I am sure with more time and more members involved you can think up even more ideas. If you missed the Zone Meeting, as small groups we worked to think of needs in our community. Some of these needs may be too big for your club to tackle. Is there another organization that you could partner with to tackle it together? Is it so large a problem that the Lions need to mobilize the whole community to solve the problem?

This is the point when most Lions projects fail! Before we even begin, we realize we are too small a club. We don't go looking for more members to assist us, we just say it can't be done. We don't call the president of the Rotary; we just say we do not have the manpower to accomplish such a lofty goal. We don't go to the public and say we want to address this issue in our community, and we need everyone to help, instead we just drop the idea. To make our communities better requires leadership. It requires people to stop making excuses and start acting. It requires that we consider our fears of failure or rejection and then work beyond them. Successful people are not with out fear, they learn to not let it consume and control them. I recently heard this question posed, "Is it better to do three projects you are fairly certain will succeed and have them succeed or attempt thirty projects where you believe only half will succeed?". Fifteen is a lot better success rate than three, but fifty percent failure is far worse than one hundred percent success. Which is better for our community? A critical part of growing as a leader is to learn from our failures and incorporate that knowledge into our next endeavor. To often we try to forget failure and not learn from it. You can learn much more from failure than you can from success. Therefore, most truly successful entrepreneurs usually have two or even more bankruptcies before they succeed. They learn from their mistakes and don't let fear of failure stop them. Let's not let our fear of failure hinder us from truly accomplishing the big things our communities need.

This month will be the second round of Zone Meetings. The focus will be membership recruitment and retention. I hope as many Lions as possible turn out for what I am sure will be an amazing learning experience. We make excuses why people don't want to join Lions, when the real problem is, we fail to present a good reason to join. In some cases, we even fail to deliver a product that is worth joining. A club that sits around at meetings and discusses issues but never really accomplishes anything is not going to attract new members. We talk a lot about being open to new ideas, but many clubs really aren't. Too many people only believe in change if it is their idea. Many "leaders" in the clubs don't want change for they fear a loss of their own power. Real leaders endear themselves to their followers by developing them into leaders also. In fact, the best way to tackle membership recruitment is to treat it as a project. We talk a lot about being open to new ideas, but many clubs really aren't. When it comes to recruitment, another way I believe we fail is by not believing that we are truly offering potential members a great opportunity. I know each one of you believe in this organization and its mission. When we approach potential members, you should have no doubt that you are

We can reach for new heights of service by strengthening our own leadership skills. We will strengthen our organization by recruiting more hands for service. Lets no longer except excuses from ourselves, or fear failure and rejection. Our communities can not afford our weakness. The keys to our success are believing in the Lions organization to improving our world and believing in our own abilities to overcome the obstacles before us.

Ohio Lions Sight and Hearing Foundation

The Ohio Lions Sight and Hearing Foundation is a charity available to all Lions Clubs in the state of Ohio, Multiple District 13. The main goal of our Foundation is to help provide funds for those medical services that are beyond the limits of local Lions Clubs or District Foundations related to eyes and ears.

Lions are famous for our focus on sight preservation and assistance to those with sight impairment. Our goal is to help those who fall beyond the scope of government programs, can't afford their deductibles or coinsurance, or possibly do not have any medical insurance coverage. In addition, some treatments are not typically covered by insurance such as vision therapy and hearing aids. Individuals whose income is at or below 200% of current Federal Poverty Levels are eligible to apply for assistance. One in three residents in Ohio fall within this income level.

Our medical directors will review all applications, medical necessity of treatments, and consult with the applicant's surgeon, as needed, to choose the best option for treatment. As there are limits for the aid available, we will negotiate the lowest cost for treatment, and no treatment will be

providing financial help for are:

corneal transplants, cataract surgery, laser eye treatments, other approved eye surgeries, assistance with purchase of special, expensive eyeglasses and vision equipment, and hearing aids.

All inquiries are to be sponsored by a Lions Club, Zone or District. The sponsor should help the individual complete the application, coordinate with the District Sight and Hearing Chair, and contribute towards the care needed, if possible.

The Foundation will NOT consider: Purchase of ordinary glasses or exams. These can be provided by local Lion Clubs or through our partnership with Prevent Blind-

ness Ohio.

Any treatment already received. All cases MUST have prior approval by the Board.

We will only pay out of state doctors within 50 miles of the Ohio border, and typically in cases when those providers are the closest available for some of our rural Ohio areas.

We will not provide funds for anything covered and paid by the individual's own insurance.

The Foundation accepts donations from individuals, businesses, and Lions Clubs, and all donations are tax deductible. Please work with Board members in your District for donations and applications for assistance. Members are:
