

Some where in the back of my closet hangs my most prized piece of clothing, and like a million others I have not worn mine since I graduated from High School. If you ever wore the blue corduroy jacket of the FFA, I would be willing to bet yours is still in your possession also. Hot in the summer, cold in the winter and oh so stylish that jacket represents a time in our lives when we belonged. It had your name on the front, and on the back was your state and chapter. My FFA jacket has been replaced in my life by the red Lions vest and I am every bit as proud to be a Lion as I ever was to be an FFA member, and the vest is every bit as stylish. An article I read not to long ago talked about how people do not want to be apart of an organization, they want to be a member of a "tribe" or a close knit group much like a family. In the case of my FFA jacket it said I belonged to the Ashland chapter, a group that contained my closest friends. My Lions vest says Buckeye State, and though I have many close friends throughout Lionism and throughout the state we are not as close knit. To me, and I believe most Lions, the more bonding connection is that I am a Hayesville Lion or a member of the local club. The goal is to make everyone feel they are apart of something special.

When talking about what makes a club successful, part of the conversation needs to include whether or not the members feel as though they belong. When trying to attract new members are we presenting a family style close knit group or are we just another organization. Giving current and potential members the sense of belonging to a group worth belonging to is important. To feel involved, members need to be included in the activities and the directing of the club, they also need to feel welcome, new or old members left on their own off to the side during a meeting will not remain members for long. This may sound like a contradiction, we often talk about how our club meetings must be focused and not drawn out. How do we then allow for the interaction that allows for the bonding of our members? Keeping business meetings and social meetings separate is one possible solution. You may find some members attend only one or the other meeting depending on their personal needs. Do they want a social experience or to experience more of a level of accomplishment?

Keeping your entire membership aware of what is going on is very important. Many clubs don't have a newsletter. You don't need to have a major literary work to communicate to your members the facts of what is happening in your club, a brief email can keep your membership informed. Far to often we do not communicate well enough what is going on. We assume members know, but you may be surprised how much they are not aware of. Effective and repeated communication is essential to keeping members involved and up to date on club activities.

I believe the most important point in attracting new members and retaining the ones we have is to make sure we have a club worth belonging to. If the point of your club is to meet for dinner twice a month, than forget about recruiting members to serve your community. If the only projects worth doing are the ones your club does now, then forget about finding younger people willing to serve alongside you. Just like selling a gadget in a store, a Lions club must present itself as something worthy of spending your money and time on. Is your club worth belonging to?

I have shared with many of you at the Zone Meetings about how Ohio Lions helped develop the contact lens. I have also talked in the past about how we funded the research for the prevention of River Blindness. Together we can accomplish so much. With that thought in mind, I am asking each club to give a little more to LCIF Campaign 100. Did you know that right now here in the United States, **LCIF is funding research into the connections between Diabetes and Alzheimer's? Is Alzheimer's enough of a problem in your area that you could support that kind of research? I know a lot of clubs want to keep their money local to help local people, but sometimes we can help our next**

door neighbors the most by looking at the bigger picture. I am asking clubs to do one of two things. Double your normal giving to LCIF or give an additional \$250 above your normal amount. If your club usually gives \$500, however, and you want to double that amount, then that is beyond wonderful. Please don't short change other donations you normally make. I am asking each club to go above and beyond on this to help make a difference. If it takes an extra pancake breakfast or spaghetti dinner so be it. We can make a big difference in a lot of lives.

Weight Loss Challenge update. Let's just say that it has not been a good month and leave it at that.
