Fellow Lions, we are chartering new waters this Lions year. I don't believe our clubs have ever faced the challenges that this year is already presenting. I know clubs are worried as they see major fundraisers at local fairs and festivals canceled. Club service projects like vision screenings in the local schools are on hold due to COVID-19 restrictions. Many members are not able to attend meetings or events for health reasons. Situations like these are affecting every club, so let's talk.

COVID and our members. We need to acknowledge that COVID-19 is perceived by everyone from the position of their health and the loved ones they have contact with. Some members and communities are *green-light* ready to go. They can meet and continue their projects with only minor modifications. Some are *yellow-lighted*. Circumstances allow them to meet and serve, but they need the protection of our masks and social distancing. And some members and communities are *red lighted*. These members need to stay quarantined for their health and/or their loved ones; they may have to make accommodations for work and family. Moving forward, know that it is important to communicate with all members; it is equally important to help them serve as best they can. Red-lighted members may be able to make phone calls to check on others or disseminate information. They may be able to help prepare parts for a project at home in their own time. Find ways that they can get involved. For *yellow-lighted* members, be respectful with masks and social distancing and remember that your mask helps protect their family. And, above all, keep the lines of communication going with all members and respect their choices.

Service. Our communities' needs are not less because of COVID. If you talk with community members and organizations, they may have new needs stemming from today's situation. Don't give up on vision screenings and other traditional projects – things will eventually reopen. Until then, "Where there's a need, there's a Lion." Find out if the local food bank needs help, or if there are students who need clothes and supplies for the start of school. Get word out to the local papers that you will help with eye exams or glasses. Work with the city for a road-side clean-up or helping with weeding or other improvements around town. And remember that many nursing home residents haven't seen many family or friends in a while; providing cards and such brightens someone's day. Officers and service chairpersons, try to find ways to get more of your club serving.

Fundraising. Some of our clubs have enough funds for a "rainy day" situation like this, some do not. Keep your eyes open and see what others are doing. Could you do a pick-up / drive-thru dinner when you can't have your sitdown meal? Can you sell food from your trailer to walk-ups from another local hot spot if the local festival is canceled? Can you take to Facebook and email to sell tickets for your raffles? Let the community know why you are raising funds and you may be surprised at who will support you. Many communities have a town Facebook page that you can post in, or go through the local paper or Chamber of Commerce. Watch our Facebook page "Ohio Lions District OH2" for online fundraiser ideas. As I see things of interest, I will post them.

Upcoming. As a district, we are working to provide opportunities for you and your clubs to get involved. For those that want to enjoy some outdoor fellowship, we are looking for golfers on Sunday August 16 in Clyde. Green Hills Golf Course is a great course with a tasty lunch to follow. **Register at Green Hills Golf** website (events). If you don't have golfers in your club, consider sending an item for the raffle or sponsoring a hole. These donations are important. Let Lion John Meggitt know ASAP.

Also, get involved with the District STEPS Walk. We would love to have you walking or running in Fostoria with us on Sunday, September 13 to raise funds for Pediatric Cancer. We have local families in need of support and we want to donate to childhood cancer research too – it is seriously underfunded. Whether you join us on-site or participate as a virtual walker, take a photo with your red bandana and post it on the district Facebook page. Show your support for our children and families.

AND... Mark your calendars for October 4-10. This is Ohio Lions Service Week. I want to see if our district can log over 2,500 hours in service that week – hands on and in preparation time. That's A LOT of hours for 56 clubs!! Where can your members serve? Create one big project or multiple smaller ones. Take up the challenge and join Lions around Ohio in service.

And above all, have fun OH2. Despite the setbacks and hard work that organizing can be. Enjoy the service and the satisfaction of a good job done to make our communities that much better.

Resting Risk

For older adults with prediabetes, a period of temporary inactivity – during an illness or injury, for instance – can raise the risk of developing type 2 diabetes. In a study, 22 overweight adults 65-79 with prediabetes reduced their usual activity levels to less than 1,000 steps a day for 14 days and then returned to their normal activity level of about 7,000 steps per day for two weeks.

Oral glucose tolerance tests showed that they were more insulin resistant after the inactivity and didn't return to normal even two weeks later. (Because of the short length of the study, it's unclear whether levels might have eventually returned to normal – or progressed to type 2.)

Maintain your activity levels as much as possible and discuss with your doctor options for blood glucose management when you can't be active.

DISTRICT AND CLUB COMMUNITY IMPACT GRANT PROGRAM

The DCG program is an opportunity for clubs and districts to receive a grant for humanitarian services. The grant is to be used for services that impacts the communities that your club or district represents.

For the district and clubs to qualify the district must donate a total of \$10,000.00 and the clubs must donate \$5000.00 in a Lions year. This year would July 1, 2020 to June 30, 2021.

A club that donates \$5000.00 will receive grant money of 15% of the \$5000.00 and the district will receive 15% of the \$10,000.00. <u>Disaster funds to not count toward the \$5000.00 or the \$10,000</u>. The only funds that counts is funds donated toward empowering services.

The district and clubs has 15 years to use these funds. We have two clubs at this time that received the funds and our district also has funds available for humanitarian services.

Your LCIF donations at work

In June, District OH2 applied for an LCIF Emergency COVID-19 Frontline Disaster Relief grant. These were \$10,000 grants given to areas with extreme numbers who met specific criteria; they were offered for a limited time. The grant was funded in early July and we were able to split the money proportionally between Lorain and Richland counties. We are grateful to UH Hospitals across Lorain County and to the Mansfield Fire Department for their willingness to work with us to meet the grant guidelines, including the display of a Lions sign at their locations. The \$10,000 is specifically for needed materials and our donations are providing PPE for both areas and testing supplies for the Avon UH testing site. Thank you to all of the Lions who have been doing what they could to provide masks, ear-savers and other PPE for our frontline workers. If you are still making masks, our communities can use them. There is also a Buckeye Mask Project in the Columbus area to help the 55,000 students that want to study at Ohio State in September. During the COVID pandemic, LCIF has given out over \$4 million in grants world-wide. Our Campaign 100 donations ensure that they are still able to fund youth programs like Special Olympics as well as initiatives for vision, hunger, diabetes awareness, the environment, and childhood cancer. We have challenged each club and its members to give at least \$250 this year, but consider a Melvin Jones Fellowship this year to boost Campaign 100. Through 2022, our district is allotted a portion of our donations to use for club or district projects. The more we give, the bigger our impact. Think Globally, Act Locally!

Horst was also a member of St John Lutheran Church.
