Greetings and wishes for health and happy holidays. Thank-you for all of the service done and donations given over this last month. Congratulations on all of the creative ways you have found to do fundraisers, to get club business done, and to reach out to the members of your club and community.

December 1 kicks-off our *Tri-State Lions Membership Challenge*. The Lions of Ohio are teaming up to take on the multiple districts of Indiana and Michigan! From December 1 through March 31, we want to reach out to every potential member in our communities and invite them to share in our service. The state with the highest percentage of membership growth and retention takes bragging rights.

But members for the sake of numbers is not the point of this challenge. We want to grow our clubs by recruiting and retaining like-minded individuals to help us meet our communities' needs and affect change. It is a chance to examine what we are doing and how to keep our club members engaged.

So then, what is your next event? Who is your next guest speaker? Encourage each of your members to *Just Ask* - bring a guest (covid safely) who can enjoy the event.

With this challenge – if there is no fun and no fellowship, we're not doing it right. Here are some ideas to help our clubs grow during this challenge. Try, modify or retool these to fit your club's strengths.

- 1. Have a "theme"/"special guest" night each member asks someone they know in that theme. Example: have a guest speaker about a local health program and each one invites a guest interested in health and human services. Themes can follow the 5 global causes (vision, hunger, environment, diabetes, childhood cancer), a group (church, family, school, etc), or an event. Use your imagination!
- 2. Use the *Ohio Plan*. For more details, this plan is available on the district webpages.
  - \*Make sure to make prospective members feel welcome and important recognize them, have a potential member packet ready for them and follow up.
- 1. Use social media, either on your club page or invitations on a community page, to invite members or bring community awareness of your projects.

- Make personal contact with local businesses to recruit from a variety of places and encourage their input in your club. <u>WORD OF MOUTH is the</u> most affective promotion tool.
  - \* Be sure club members are ready with business cards with the club's meeting time, dates and place and a place for the recruiter's name and number/email.
- 1. Have members contribute names and information to create a contact list. Have a membership team contact those on the list with an invite to the next guest speaker or event.
- Put out a community survey and follow-up with invites and a prospective member social event.
  - \* Be ready to share the strengths of our organization and the importance of the work we do. Be ready to answer the question "Why join?" with enthusiasm and/or passion for what we do.
  - Be visible in your community (have signage, wear your Lions shirts or vests, be out at community events) – see the District 13 OH2 Facebook page for ideas and artwork for signs.

Our multiple district will be offering leadership, service and membership resources to help us in this challenge. Look in the January newsletter and your email to take advantage of these.

# Living Well with Diabetes

## **Avoiding Holiday Weight Gain**

The upcoming holiday season offers abundant opportunities to overeat and put on pound, but a recent study provides a simple strategy to help prevent that. Researchers randomly divided 111 adults without diabetes into two groups for a study period that began just before Thanksgiving and ended shortly after New Year's Day.

Participants in one group were told to weight themselves daily and to maintain their starting weight, which they did; some even lost weight. The other group, however, received no special instructions, and they gained on average of more than 6 points. Weigh yourself every day to keep tabs on how you're doing and to nudge yourself to adjust your eating habits if the number starts to creep up.

#### OHIO LIONS EYE RESEARCH FOUNDATION

The Ohio Lions Eye Research Foundation began as the Eye Research Committee in 1952 after a Representative of the National Eye Research Foundation addressed the Lions at the State Convention in 1951 and remarks were turned over to the Blind Welfare Committee for study.

At the 1952 State Convention, the committee report was accepted and the Council voted to form an Eye Research Committee. Each of the eight Governors was to appoint a committeeman from his district and Council Chairman W. R. Bryan appointed Everett Steece from the Columbus Downtown club to chair the committee.

In 1953, the committee raised \$3,600 and allocated \$1,200 to the Department of Ophthalmology, University of Cincinnati, \$1,200 to Case Western Reserve University, Cleveland and \$1,200 to the Medical College at Ohio State University, Columbus. The \$1,200 allocated to OSU was used to purchase equipment to measure the amount of oxygen administered to prematurely born babies. It had been shown a high rate of blindness in "premies," the cause: too much oxygen while incubated. The College of Optometry at OSU became a funded agency in this year.

Foundation status was granted to the committee in 1957 and it was given 501(c)(3) tax exempt status by the IRS and became known as the Ohio Lions Eye Research Foundation, OLERF.

Other funded agencies were soon added and in 1978 OLERF received a bequest from the estate of Clela Strong, Sandusky of \$138,000, to be used for education and only the income from the money be used. The next year, the Foundation established the Fellowship fund and added that all future bequests and memorials be included in this fund with the same stipulations.

In 1987, the Bryan Diabetes Fund was established for diabetes research in honor of PIP Dick Bryan's wife who suffered from diabetes.

In 1992, OSU requests OLERF to buy and build an eye research lab at a cost of \$500,000 to be paid over ten years. A final payment of \$55,000 was made in 2002.

The Neiderhauser fund for Age Related Macular Degeneration (AMD) was established in 2009 in honor of PDG Richard Neiderhauser, long time Executive Director of OLERF, who lost his sight to AMD.

In 2016, OLERF was named a beneficiary in the will of the late Lois Hagleberger Huebner, of Springfield, who passed away in December 2015 at the age of 107. The \$2.25 million bequest was placed in long term investment. The following year, the Lois Hagleberger Huebner Fellowship was started as a Young Researcher Award with a grant of \$107,000 per year for two years. OLERF is now funding two Young Researchers annually.

The Foundation recognizes clubs and Lions for donations to the General Research Fund, Bryan Diabetes Research and Neiderhauser AMD Fund. All monies received by the Foundation are used for research. Foundation Trustees are all volunteers and receive no compensation.

The Ohio Lion Eye Research Foundation is asking Lions and Lions Clubs to continue the tradition of annual contributions so OLERF can continue supporting research at OSU Optometry, OSU Ophthalmology, Case Western Reserve, University of Cincinnati, Northeast Medical College, Akron Children's Hospital and Lois Hagleberger Huebner Young Investigators.

Thanks to your contributions, OLERF has awarded over \$466,000 each year for the last two years.

Council of Governors 2020-21 International Family Members

The Ohio Lions Building Trustees met for their second quarterly meeting of the 2020-21 Lions year in late October. One trustee joined the meeting via Zoom. Also joining via Zoom were F&P Liaison, PDG Norman Cupps and DG Liaison, DG Ollie Paxton Tipple.

We have been working to find hand sanitizer dispensers and sanitizer solution to place in the building for several weeks. A source of units was located and an order placed only to have the order cancelled due to lack of supply. A OH6 zone chair offered to supply us with sanitizer units and solution recently and the units should be installed prior to the COG meeting in November.

 $2^{nd}$  floor window update: The delivery of the windows has been delayed due to the shortage of materials to the manufacturer for the production of the windows. The most recent communication for the supplier is that the windows are expected to be delivered to him in early November. Once the windows arrive we will be meeting with the vendor to schedule details and target date to begin the installation of the new windows.

We are also addressing a tear in the awning across the front of the building. The trustees have engaged a vendor to replace the current awnings on the building. He will be working with us to schedule the awning replacement at the same time as the window installation. The plan is to remove the current old awnings prior to the installation of the windows in order to facilitate the window installation and secondly, not to damage the new awnings with a mishap with the window installation.

In reviewing the 1st quarter financial information for the building we realize some of the utilities have undergone significant cost increases. We are currently evaluating these costs and plan to contact other vendors for price quotes and comparisons for these services.

One of our goals is to strive to maintain the Lions State Office Building as a well maintained building and in good repair for both the Ohio Lions and our tenants, This can go a long way to provide a proud location for all to conduct business and welcome guests and customers.

The Building Trustees will continue to diligently serve the Lions of Ohio. We do our utmost to operate and maintain the Ohio Lions State Office Building in a responsible manner. As chair of the Building Trustees, I truly appreciate each trustee's input and dedication to the elected task of overseeing the Ohio Lions State Office Building.

# **Port Clinton Lions**



# Cameron Kegley Named Pioneer Student of the Month


Pioneer Career and Technology Center announces Cameron Kegley as our September 2020 Student of the Month.
