# Living Well with Diabetes

#### **Stay Independent**

No surprise: Growing older can make physical activities more difficult. A healthy diet, however, may help. Researchers recruited 12, 658 men ages 63 and older (fewer than 10 percent had diabetes) and measured their ability to do everyday tasks, such as getting dressed, carrying groceries, and climbing stairs. They also scored their diets on a healthy-eating scale. Four years later, **the men who ate the healthiest diets were 26% less likely to have physical impairments compared with those who ate the least nutritious food**. The study did not prove that a poor diet causes impairment – men with physical impairments may have had trouble cooking healthful meals, for instance – but the link supports prior findings on the importance of healthy eating. Be sure to include good-for-you foods such as fruits, veggies, and nuts in your regular eating plan.



#### **Hayesville Lions**

The Hayesville Lions Club met March 18 at the Conservation Farm with Exclusively Yours Catering serving a delicious meal.

Dan McNaull, general manager of Firelands Electric was the speaker. In 1937 Firelands was formed. Their lines run around Pinhook, Willard, Celeryville, New London, Wakeman, Rowsburg, Jeromesville, etc. There are 9,000 members. Firelands is one cooperative out of twenty four in Ohio. They generate their own power. They have the round up program which members round up their bill and that money goes to fund community programs. They give rebates on hot water heaters, electric stoves, refrigerators, freezers, and dishwashers.

Villages and schools are Firelands biggest customers. They are trying to get transmission lines along roads. Ohio Edison owns transmission lines and Firelands pays to use them. They recently bought a track vehicle which has a digger, can set poles, and you can pin a bucket on it. Firelands puts poly wrap around the poles to keep varmints from climbing the pole and causing trouble. There is a plate on the pole to ground it. They built a wooden A frame for osprey nests on the cross arms at Pleasant Hill. Firelands tries to keep costs down. They have capitol credits for customers which are available after twenty two years, but if someone dies, you can redeem them at a reduced rate.

In the 1970's the Ohio Territorial Act divided areas for the electric companies and decided who was to have which company and it still is observed. The Cardinal Plant is coal fired and runs 24/7. A carbon tax may come into practice to govern air quality and farmers would be affected as cattle give off methane gas.

If you put solar in your home you still have a smaller electric bill and must pay on your solar panels for twenty years. Electric vehicles cost 1/3 of gas ones. The charger on the car takes a long time to charge. You can buy a faster charger that works in eight hours for at least \$1.500.

Firelands have solar panels and customers bought into them reasonably and it cuts down on costs.

Lion Bill Harner gave the secretaries report and Lion Mike Kelly gave the treasurer's report. Lion Dick Dilgard read the slate of officers for 2021-2022. Officer Training is May 1 for Presidents, Vice Presidents, Secretaries, and Membership Chairs. All other officers will meet on zoom for their classes on May 2. June 5 the Conservation Farm needs help with fishing from 8 - 12 and 12:30 - finish. Anyone who can help please call Dean Whitcomb at 419-651-1942. April 1 business meeting will be at Tresa and Greg Hess's home. April 15 Dinner meeting at Hayesville United Methodist Church with Membership Night and with a doctor from Ashland Eye Care speaking.


