Nov. 15 is the due date for IRS Form 990 filing and Ohio Attorney General's Statement of Continued Existence. Treasurers are also reminded for Ohio Sales Tax report in January (fiscal year clubs) for ½ year via the Ohio Business Gateway. LCI has also begun financial suspension, leading to termination, of clubs that are 120 days past due on club dues. Clubs are reminded to remain current on their LCI/District dues payments! Thank you for your assistance.

2021 District 13 OH-2 Poinsettia Sale Information

Clubs may schedule pickups beginning November 26; and all orders need to be placed for pick up by December 16. This allows our supplier time to set aside sufficient flowers to fill all requests. Pricing, colors and sizes are the same as last year.

All orders are to be processed through Chair Lion Ann Miller to receive Lions pricing. 6-1/2" poinsettias are \$8.50 and 8-1/2" poinsettias are \$16.50. All payments will be handled through OH-2 Treasurer PCC Forrest (Woody) Conrad, Jr., who will then forward payment to Pinehaven Nursery and Greenhouse. Send all orders either by mail or email to Lion Ann. Money goes into the Poinsettia Sale Account from which a number of District projects and activities are funded.

18 district clubs participated last year selling a total of 861 poinsettias and putting close to \$2100 into the District Poinsettia Fund as well as money into some clubs' treasuries with their fundraising efforts.
