OHIO LIONS STATE OFFICE BUILDING TRUSTEES 2021-22 3rd QTR REPORT FEBRUARY 12, 2022

The Ohio Lions Building Trustees met for their third quarterly meeting of the 2021-22 Lions year in late January. Trustees were present from Districts OH1, OH2, OH3, OH4, OH5, OH6 and OH7. It was great to have all trustees present. This meeting was held via a Zoom on line meeting link. Also joining were DG Liaison Kevin Reidy and F&P Liaison, PDG Norman Cupps. MDS Debbie Luttrell was excused from the meeting.

During the review of the financial report for the year to date we learned from PDG Norman Cupps, F&P Liaison that a "refund" had been posted to the Building Restricted Fund. This was quite a surprise to the trustees to learn of such a "windfall", though we were not confident of its accuracy. PDG Jay offered to contact MDS Debbie the next day to learn more details of this "windfall". PDG Jay learned this was an accounting situation with an item being posted to the wrong account.

Contact will be made with PDG Rob Murry and/or PCC Jay Gray to make proper adjustments.

Discussion was held regarding a safety deposit box for the Ohio Lions. This subject had been discussed for quite some time. Further inquiry the next day provided information that a safety deposit box was in place at Fifth Third Bank. Further information will be available at our next meeting as to its contents and such. Discussion was also held regarding a total building security system. PDG Jay commented he had held some brief discussion with some of the building tenants to learn of their thoughts. We plan to contact some security companies to learn of available plans to meet the needs of the Ohio Lions and the building tenants.

The service and mowing of the "large lawn area" of the building was taken care of by the Grove City Noon Lions Club as a club service project last year at no cost to the Ohio Lions. The trustees elected to make a contribution to the Grove City Noon Lions Club as a "Thank You" for their service to the Ohio Lions State Office Building in the amount of \$250. We will be contacting them again this year to offer the club the opportunity to again take care of the lawn.

The water/sewer expense is out of line for the year. PCC Dave Risen has been in contact with the Columbus City Water and Sewer Division. A representative will visit the building in the near future to investigate the possibility of a leak. We did learn that billings are estimated quite frequently and we currently feel the estimates are not in line with our normal usage. Further study will be made with this issue.

PDG Jay shared with the OH6 and OH7 trustees that their 3 year terms are due for election this year.

The Building Trustees will continue to diligently serve the Lions of Ohio. We do our utmost to

operate and maintain the Ohio Lions State Office Building in a responsible manner. As chair of the Building Trustees, I truly appreciate each trustee's input and dedication to the elected task of overseeing the Ohio Lions State Office Building.

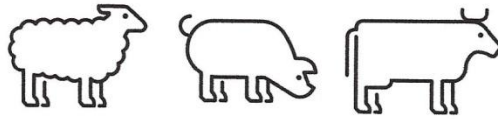

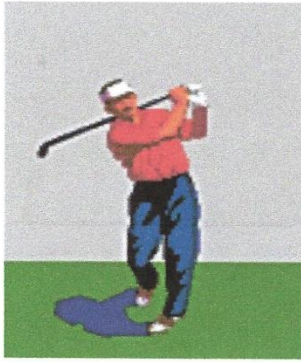

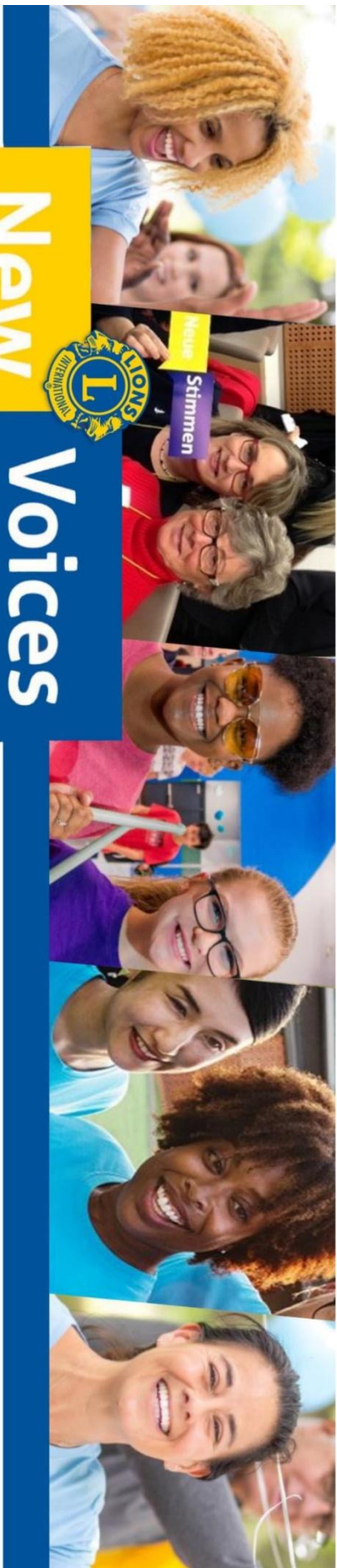
