

I totally forgot in last month’s newsletter to say THANK YOU to the Bellville Lions for preparing the delicious lunch at our District Convention, so THANKS AGAIN for the lunch. You surprised me!

It is finally beginning to feel like Spring. It’s getting warmer, the days are getting longer and Lions are getting out into their communities. District conventions are over and State Convention is just a few short weeks away. Have you ever attended the Ohio Lions State Convention? It will be May 19-20 at the **Marriott Columbus Northwest**, 5605 Blazer Pkwy, Dublin, OH 43017. Go to ohiolions.org for the registration form and more information. It is a fun time to connect with Lions from all over Ohio, trade pins, fund-raising and service project ideas. You can bring your clean pill bottles, IPCC/State GST Kerry Parker will be collecting them. There is also a business session, which this year has an item to vote on, that being a \$5 a year State dues increase. Here is the language:

MD-13 Constitution Existing language: Section 3 State Revenue and Funds The revenue received under Section 1 and 2 of Article VIII shall be distributed as state funds and as district funds [Refer to Article X Section 1.]. The state funds shall total \$12.16 of the annual per capita dues. The allocation of state revenue among funds will be determined by the Council of Governors upon recommendation of the Finance and Long-Range Planning Committee and will be documented in the MD13 Policy Manual.

Proposed Language, change in RED Section 3 State Revenue and Funds The revenue received under Section 1 and 2 of Article VIII shall be distributed as state funds and as district funds [Refer to Article X Section 1.]. The state funds shall total \$17.16 of the annual per capita dues. The allocation of state revenue among funds will be determined by the Council of Governors upon recommendation of the Finance and Long-Range Planning Committee and will be documented in the MD13 Policy Manual.

Rationale: Since there has been a decline in membership since the last dues increase over 12 years ago, the Ohio Lions membership has dropped over 4000 Lions. This loss of revenue has impacted the two operational funds of MD13 (State Council and Office Operations). These funds are losing approximately \$25,000 each year and are estimated to run out of money around 2025-2027. For this reason, a dues increase is proposed. Cutting costs has been performed during this timeframe. However, there is a limit to this; after that Lion services must be impacted.

An organization that is actively cutting services such as training and recruiting Lion leaders cannot thrive. A thriving growing Ohio Lions is in everyone's best interest. If the Ohio Lions had not lost these members (i.e. over \$40,000 in in one year alone), this proposal would not be necessary. We have been unable to stem our losses in membership. To survive and then hopefully grow, the Ohio Lions need to approve this proposal.

SO, as you might have heard, CC/IPDG Kevin Reidy has issued a Membership Challenge beginning May 1 to June 30, 2023. Each club that adds TWO new members during this time period will be recognized at the 2024 District Convention. IPCC Kerry reported that last year there were 56 clubs in the state (OH2 has 56 clubs) achieved this. To make this more enticing, I am adding something that one of the other Governor's is doing and I liked the idea. I will personally donate \$250 to LCIF on behalf of the club that adds the most new Lions during this time (ending June 30, 2023) AND a fully-funded Pizza party (not including alcohol) at the place of the club's choice in July or August.

We are losing clubs this Lions year. Nevada, Lorain Harbor and Sycamore, just to name a few. Others are at the point of

just a few members and considering turning in their charters. Let's not let this happen anymore. When it does, it hurts the community that they have been serving. Who is going to help?? Certainly not the government (enough said). Let's Serve!! We Serve!! See you at Leadership School!!

“If you build it they will come.” That was the famous phrase from the movie “Field of Dreams” in which Kevin Costner builds a baseball diamond in a rural farm field that is soon filled with baseball legends from the past. What if we took the same approach with our service project? I recently had the opportunity to listen to an International Director who took this approach with a small, struggling club that had lost its energy due to an aging membership. He jumped in as an Associate Member and “built” service projects in their small community. He laid the groundwork; scheduled the day; coordinated with community leaders and put the word out asking for volunteers come the community to help. People from the community showed up. He went out into the

community and found some more needs to meet. He planned a second, and then a third project.

And people showed up. The club began getting new members. People were ASKING to join. And these new Members stayed with the club because they were given a job to do, a task to complete, they had a purpose being part of this service club. They had a reason to show up. The club continued to grow at an astounding rate. Some service projects were small and simple needing only a few Lions. Some were huge requiring many Lions, as well as partnering with other organizations. Big or small, they each touched someone’s life and they also gave life back to the once small club.

Some people are Leaders. They have a vision, like to plan and they want to take the lead. They are easy to spot. They are usually the ones you don’t want to give a microphone to as they have a lot to say. Some people only want directions to follow. They don’t want the microphone. Just tell me when to show up and what I need to do, and I am there. Both are equally important. Without the vision the club does not have direction. Without the workers, the vision sits on the shelf, waiting. When the Vision sits on the shelf the needs of the community are not being met. Who is/are your club leaders? Do you need a little help? Challenge them to come up with 10 service projects for this Lions year. Find out what your community needs are then schedule them, plan them,

advertise them, and then watch the people show up. Make some of them big enough that you need to put out a request for help from the community. Make them diverse enough that you are reaching into different groups and areas of your community. At the end of your Lions year, let me know the impact it had on your Club, your community and you

personally. I know your story is going to be good!!!

Regarding the upcoming state convention ballot

In May 2023, the delegates to the State Convention will vote on a proposed \$5.00 dues increase. This will be the first dues increase since July 2010.

The two administrative funds [State Council and Office Operations] are estimated to go to \$0.00 in the 2025-2027 timeframe as they are losing about \$25,000 total each year. These are the two funds that are most impacted by rising everyday costs.

Since 2017, the Council of Governors have made cuts and changes to the state budget to keep every account in the black. We have sought grant funding from LCI to supplement leadership and membership initiatives to support districts while freeing up state funds. Future cuts will slice into essential leadership and membership services at the club and district levels.

For those that are worried that the costs of building maintenance are at the heart of this increase, know that costs associated with the building are **not** taken from dues money. The Ohio Lions building is designed to be self-funding.

To clarify, with the \$7.00 LCI dues increase approved last June, this additional \$5.00 for MD13 dues totals \$12.00 a year. This is \$1.00 a month.

All of us understand the cost of inflation and how it impacts us. Our state office is no different. A dues increase will be necessary to be fiscally responsible as an organization. This \$5 increase is set so that we don't have to ask for another increase for another decade or more.

As your club considers their vote on this matter, please discuss whether or not it is better to raise the dues now, while we are used to all of our costs rising, or whether we should apply the raise if and when costs eventually even out.

This proposed \$5.00 dues increase is a choice that will have to be made for the future of Lionism in Ohio. Clubs are urged to carefully weigh our fiscal responsibility with member needs.

The Past District Governor Association encourages you to support this dues increase.

Diabetic Ketoacidosis

Last month we talked about what can happen if your blood glucose goes too low-hypoglycemia and how to prevent and/or treat it. Today we're going to discuss another complication that can happen if your blood sugar is too high or if you are dehydrated or sick. This complication at the very least will land you in the hospital and it can be deadly. It is a complication that can be prevented by keeping your blood glucose under good control. It is called Diabetic Ketoacidosis or DKA. Typically, people with Type 1 diabetes are at higher risk for this but it does occasionally happen in people with Type 2 diabetes.

When the body doesn't have enough insulin to move glucose into the cells so that the body can use it for energy, the cells starve and the body has to make energy from other sources. The process of doing this causes the blood to become more acidic which can cause breathing to become labored. It can also cause the body to start making ketones, not only in the blood but they can also show up in the urine. This can also lead to dehydration and some people end up in a coma. This can also cause changes in the levels of sodium and potassium in the body. Most of the time people who are experiencing this have very high blood glucose levels, but not always, especially if they are dehydrated or sick.

There are several things that can cause DKA:

- Being sick, having an infection or being under high amount of stress
- Not taking insulin as prescribed

- Having problems with an insulin pump and not seeking help
- If insulin goes bad due to being in extreme temperatures
- Having a delay in being diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes
- Taking an SGLT2 medication for Type 2 diabetes

There are many symptoms of DKA:

- Being extremely thirsty
- Needing to urinate frequently
- Nausea and/or vomiting
- Having a fruity type smell to the breath
- Breathing very deeply
- Being drowsy
- Having stomach pain
- Going into a coma

There are ways to prevent DKA:

- Keep your blood glucose under control. This means you need to take your diabetes medications especially if you have Type 1 diabetes on insulin
- Checking your blood glucose levels frequently especially if you are sick or are under stress
- Keep either urine ketone test strips on hand and use them as instructed or get a blood glucose meter that can also test for ketones
- Stay hydrated especially when you are sick or if you take SGLT2 medications for your diabetes
- Have a backup plan for insulin if you use an insulin pump and are having problems
- Stay in touch with your diabetes health care team especially if you are sick or under a lot of stress

For more information, talk with your health care provider and get a referral to a certified diabetes care and education specialist in your area.

They now have a visitor's center, auditorium and most of the house is open. There is a greenhouse, vegetable and cutting garden. Support buildings such as a fancy chicken coop, carriage house, and workshop are included. The historic duck pond and wetlands were constructed to filter the water.

Sculptures created by Sean Kenney out of lego bricks are fully glued and steel reinforced are throughout the mansion, and mostly on the grounds. A bonsai tree is in the mansion. A Monarch on Milkweed, buck, hummingbird, dragonfly, galapagos tortoise, wheelbarrow, and peacock are some of the creations.


