Allow me to introduce myself. I am PDG (twice) Dave Stockum and am honored to serve as Council Chairperson for the 2023-2024 Lions year. One of my personal goals is to broaden the lines of communication throughout the district. If we can share those things that have been successful in our clubs and districts over the years, we can all grow as individual Lions and clubs and do a better job of the thing that Lions were created to do – Serve! I would like to take advantage of the opportunity this first month of the Lions year to announce some of the new leaders who have stepped up to serve MD13. We will have coordinators in each of the Global Causes of our International Association. Lion Ernie Richmann from the Painesville Lions Club is going to be the Diabetes Coordinator. Lions Kirby Witmer from the Columbus Northern Lions Club is going to be the Environment Coordinator. At this time, we are still searching for a Hunger Coordinator. As Executive Director of the Ohio Lions Pediatric Cancer Foundation, OH5 DG Mike Kerek is the Childhood Cancer Coordinator, and OH1 PDG Bill Niejadlik from the Sight and Hearing Committee is the Vision Coordinator. These folks will act as resources, sharing information on projects both in practice and potential, as well as presenting quarterly articles in the State Newsletter pertaining to their particular cause. Their reports to the Council of Governors will be available on the MD13 Website as well. New Voices is a relatively new Lions program that is growing in popularity, and Lion Tamarra Parker-Stephens from the Millersport Lions Club, the New Voices Coordinator, is working on defining just what New Voices entails. ## **District Committee's Information**

The new Lion portal is an evolution of our current digital tools. MyLion, MyLCI and Insights won't be available when you log into the new portal. Instead, you'll access the various functions you performed in those products directly from the *homepage*. For example, rather than clicking into MyLion to report your service, you'll access service reporting directly from the main portal page. We don't know yet what these tabs will be called, but LCI is working to make the new labeling very self-explanatory.

When will the new Lion Portal open? We don't have an exact date for the technology rollout. While originally it was set for the end of July 2023, it may be September or even later until it opens. LCI realizes that it is important to test the site appropriately and make the necessary fixes *before* releasing it to our 1.4 million Lions.

For log-ins -- To ensure the security of your account, current Lion Account passwords are encrypted. This means LCI cannot see them or port them over into a new system. Because of this, you will be prompted when it's time to update your Lion Account credentials — your username and password — to access the Lion Portal. Please note that we can no longer support the use of telephone numbers as usernames, so you will need to use a unique email — one that is only used by you — and create a new password to log in.

Until the technology transition happens, officers will still be able to access bills, input new members, and update member information. For reporting service, the internet website <a href="app.mylion.org">app.mylion.org</a> will still be available for inputting service projects. However, some people are experiencing difficulties with their smartphone MyLion apps. There is no patch for the smartphone apps, we don't foresee those glitches being fixed. Please contact your district governor or district global service coordinator for your district's protocol for service reporting between July 1 and the rollout of the new system.

MyLion, MyLCI and Insights as we know them today will not be available once the new Lion Portal is live. However, the same functionality of those tools will be available. For example, instead of clicking on MyLCI to access your member roster, you'll be able to click into a member reporting section on the main portal page where you can access your roster. The functions will no longer be housed within separate tools. *New member information and billing information will not be lost in this transition.* It will simply be accessed through a different tab/tool.

The new portal is built on Salesforce, a commercially available platform used by over 150,000 organizations, including 40,000 nonprofits. Salesforce is the recognized industry leader in relationship management systems and will allow us to offer a rich and continually improving digital experience. #### Type 1 Diabetes

Welcome to our final article about diabetes. Lion's Club is an excellent platform for providing information about diabetes topics. We hope this year long series of articles has provided good information and motivation for those living with diabetes for improvement in self-care, and expanded your understanding, and ability to discuss diabetes related topics as you engage in Lion's Club activities. The information we have shared with you over the past year has focused mainly on type 2 diabetes, treatment options, complications, and resources for care.

However, there is also another main type of diabetes called type 1 diabetes. About 5% of the population of people who have diabetes in the US have type 1 diabetes. In most people with type 1 diabetes, the body's immune system — which normally fights to destroy harmful bacteria and viruses — mistakenly destroys insulin-producing (islet) cells in the pancreas. Genetics and environmental factors appear to play a role in this process.

- The exact cause is unknown.
- There is no cure, therefore, treatment with lifelong insulin therapy (either by multiple daily injections or by insulin pump) is necessary for living well and prevention of complications.
- The treatment plan also includes frequent checking of blood glucose levels and healthy eating plan
  with carbohydrate counting. An overall healthy lifestyle including regular physical activity is
  strongly encouraged.
- It is formerly known as juvenile diabetes or insulin dependent diabetes.
- Type 1 diabetes can be diagnosed at any age but most frequently before the age of 30.
- Signs and Symptoms include increased thirst, frequent urination, possibly bed-wetting in toilettrained child, extreme weight loss, unintentional weight loss, fatigue, irritability or behavior changes, fruity-smelling breath.

Since it may be diagnosed in very young children, a responsible adult educated in the management of type 1 diabetes is extremely important to provide the care necessary until the child progressively learns the self-care skills to become independent in managing this condition as they mature into adulthood. Therefore, it is recommended that the child, parents, caregivers, and school personnel be educated as well to provide ongoing support for the day-to-day management of the diabetes, while promoting normal growth and development. If uncontrolled, type 1 diabetes, just as in type 2 diabetes, high blood glucose can lead to serious long-term complications including: heart disease, stroke, kidney disease, eye problems, dental disease, nerve damage, foot problems, depression, sleep apnea.

Ongoing medical management is essential. Due to the complexity of insulin management and increasing use of technology in this field, connecting with, and routinely following up with an endocrinologist, skilled in diabetes management, is strongly recommended. Diabetes educators including nurses and dietitians with specialized skills are available to support the educational component of self-care. 
#### **Avon Lions Club**

#### **Bucyrus Lions Club**




