Diabetes Report for November

Eye Exams for People with Diabetes

#### HOW DO I KNOW IF I HAVE EYE PROBLEMS?

The best way to see if you have eye problems is to have an eye doctor check your eyes. You can have eye damage even if your vision is fine. It has nothing to do with needing glasses. Regular checkups with an eye doctor can detect eye disease early and prevent blindness. There are different types of eye care providers:

- An optician makes glasses and lenses. An optician also makes and fits contact lenses.
- An optometrist is an eye doctor who can find and treat certain eye conditions and diseases. An optometrist also prescribes glasses and contact lenses.
- An ophthalmologist is a medical doctor who finds and treats all eye diseases. Ophthalmologists can also prescribe glasses and contact lenses. An ophthalmologist can treat severe eye problems.
- A retinal specialist is an ophthalmologist who only treats problems with the retina.

People with diabetes need to have a full eye exam every year by an ophthalmologist or optometrist who knows about eye problems in people with diabetes.

#### WHAT KIND OF EYE EXAM DO I NEED?

The eye doctor will put drops in your eyes to see the retina. This is called a dilated eye exam. The eye drops will make the pupils or black part of your eyes bigger. Then your doctor can see the back of your eye and find any eye problems early.

#### WHEN DO I NEED AN EYE EXAM?

#### Adults with Type 1 Diabetes

You need to have a dilated eye exam within five years of being diagnosed and every year after that.

### Adults with Type 2 Diabetes

You need to have a dilated exam soon after you have found out you have diabetes. About 1 in 5 people with type 2 diabetes have some eye problems when they are diagnosed with diabetes. That's why it's important to have an eye exam soon after you find out you have diabetes.

After the first eye exam, all adults with diabetes should have a dilated eye exam every year, although your doctor may suggest every 2 or 3 years after a normal exam. Exams may be needed more often than once a year if you have eye problem.

So have your eyes checked regularly and keep a happy outlook!!!!!!!

### 2023 Poinsettia Sale Information:

To receive Lion's pricing, ALL orders must be placed through a Lions or Leo Club. A club may place multiple orders designating different pick up dates. Send orders either by mail or email to Lion Ann Miller who coordinates with Pinehaven Garden Center and Cabinet Treasurer Lion Tom Frasz. Schedule to pick up all orders by December 16.

Club must take an order copy when making the flower pick-up. Clubs pay NO money directly to Pinehaven. They bill the District for total sales. Make club checks to DISTRICT 13 OH-2 POINSETTIA SALE. Send check to Lion Ann with your club order – or send check and a copy of club order to CT Lion Tom. Lion Ann will coordinate all club orders with Pinehaven and will forward all checks received to CT Lion Tom.

Clubs are to forward to District 13 OH-2: \$8.75 for each 6-1/2" poinsettia sold and \$16.75 for each 8-1/2" poinsettia sold. Money goes into the Poinsettia Sale Fund account from which a number of District projects and activities are funded.

Clubs may schedule flower pick-ups beginning November 18. Pinehaven will have a copy of your club order to match with copy you bring. Your club needs to coordinate the pick-up time directly with them. If making several pick-ups, you will need to have a completed order form for each one. It is too confusing for everyone to attempt to pick up "split" orders.

Pinehaven will schedule a delivery to your club if your order totals a minimum of \$250. Delivery cost is extra. This charge IS direct responsibility of the club to Pinehaven and is to be paid with the delivery.

If your club is also using this poinsettia sale as a fund raising activity, you may want to create your own order form using the pricing you have established. Remember to allow for sales tax.






