News from the Council Chair

Happy Winter. That second week of January was cold weatherwise, but hot in Lions Land. The thermometer reached zero, but we added sixty new members in the first two weeks of January. Best wishes to the new club at Willoughby Hills, which chartered with 33 members on January 18. January 27th the Marion Lions Club celebrated its new charter. We need to average 85 new members a month for the remainder of this Lions Year to reach the LCI goal of 957 new members for the year. Incidentally, the Constitutional Area noted the fine job we are doing recruiting new members and raised the initial goal of 918 to this new number. Great job on the plus side, but we need to put a dent in the minus membership category. We must focus on retention of our current members to make membership growth a fact. Club satisfaction surveys, direct contact with inactive members, and increased and publicized service are all ways to stem losing members.

I am confident when you see the Recruiters Passport program unveiled at the Winter Retreat and disseminated to local Lions by mid-February, you will be further encouraged to get out in your communities and "Ask One (or two or three…)" to be part of our Lions family. Speaking of the Winter Retreat, over 140 Lions gathered at Salt Fork Lodge for an enjoyable and educational MLK Weekend. Sessions ranging from Bigfoot to New Voices were well-presented, and old and new friendships were re/established.

Besides the Recruiters Passport Program, I am challenging each club to be a 100% club in service, leadership and membership. Each club will receive a postcard after the February 10 Council of Governors Meeting challenging them to submit a report using the Lions Portal (we are almost at 100% in MD13 already), to submit their PU-101 officer report to LCI by May 15, and to finish the year +2 in growth. I will check the statistics for each club mailing me the completed postcard at the end of the 2023-2024 Lions Year and send the successful clubs a 2"X 2" banner pin designating them a 100% Lions Club in service, leadership and growth for 2023-2024. If the year were to end today, 47 of our 353 clubs would receive this designation. This is a personal

challenge and funding for it is not coming from MD13 funds! I believe we can achieve this and am "putting my money where my mouth is."

Let's go; let's grow... in service and in membership. Let's be leaders in the field of charitable organizations and in our own clubs and districts. Have a great February.



ADVICE FOR PEOPLE NEWLY DIAGNOSED WITH DIABETES

Think about when you or someone you know was diagnosed with <u>diabetes</u>. It can feel overwhelming and emotional. It's hard to know where to start sometimes. I had a patient who was newly diagnosed with <u>type 2 diabetes</u> ask me what advice I normally give to people like her. I thought it was a great question and one worth sharing.

1. Start with the Diabetes Plate Method

A great starting place when thinking about food and planning meals, is using <u>ADA</u>'s <u>Diabetes Plate</u> <u>Method</u>. This is a picture of a plate where 50% of the plate is non-starchy vegetables, 25% <u>protein</u>, and 25% carbohydrates. This means that 75% of your plate is low to no carbohydrates. You don't have to weigh and measure food, just use your plate to plan portions. Think about variety when you use the plate method. Change up the <u>protein</u>, vegetables, and <u>carbs</u> to increase <u>nutrients</u> and keep your plate interesting.

2. Choose Healthy Drinks

Another important first step is making sure what you drink is healthy and not causing your <u>glucose</u> to spike. While you may have stopped drinking soda, remember that 100% juice, sweetened coffee, and sports or energy drinks can still add unwanted <u>sugar</u>. Diet drinks, meaning those containing <u>artificial sweeteners</u>, can be used but it is best to limit those as well. Diet drinks may not directly raise <u>blood glucose</u>, but the more your taste buds are exposed to sweet the more you crave sweets. <u>Artificial sweeteners</u> aren't neutral and have also been linked to <u>glucose</u> changes and decreasing the good bacteria in your gut.

Start by drinking more water. Other healthy drink options include sparking water, fruit-infused water, coconut water, unsweetened coffee or tea, vegetable juice, kefir, milk, or unsweetened plant-based milks such as almond, coconut, oat, or soy milk.

People with <u>diabetes</u> need to stay hydrated. <u>Dehydration</u> can lead to high <u>glucose</u> and high <u>glucose</u> levels can cause <u>dehydration</u>. A bonus is that being hydrated can also keep you feeling satisfied. Carry water with you during the day as a reminder to drink often.

3. Be Carb Aware

Eating healthy with <u>diabetes</u> is about more than carbohydrates, but a good starting place is carb awareness. The first step of carb awareness is knowing which foods raise <u>glucose</u> and which ones don't. The food groups that contain carbohydrates include <u>starch</u> (pasta, rice, bread,

cereal, <u>legumes</u>), fruits, vegetables (starchy and non-starchy), milk and yogurt. <u>Protein</u> (poultry, fish, meat, eggs, cheese) and fats (oils, avocado, nuts, seeds) contain very few to no <u>carbs</u>.

The second step to carb awareness is starting to look at portions, or the amount of <u>carbs</u> you eat. This can be done using the <u>Diabetes</u> Plate Method or using measuring cups. Recommendations for portions should be individualized to your needs.

Remember that being carb aware doesn't mean eating very low carb. <u>Fiber</u> is a type of <u>carbohydrate</u> that is most known for keeping us regular, but it helps slow down the rise in <u>glucose</u>, creates happy gut bacteria, and takes waste out of our body including things like hormones and toxins. Choose <u>carbs</u> high in fibers such as vegetables, whole grains, fruits, and <u>legumes</u>.


