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Happy Fall!!! I kicked off fall with attending my very first US Canada Forum in Louisville, KY. It was a weekend of informational seminars and fellowship with Lions from around the US and Canada. I want to share with you a project the encompasses the whole state of Kentucky. It began with one club and grew to be statewide. The program tests A1C, the important blood test that tells you if you are diabetic or pre-diabetic. The Lions prepare a kit for testing. This kit costs about \$10 each. The rest results take about five minutes. During the five minute wait the Lions educate the person on Diabetes and nutrition. Depending on the test results, they may be referring them to see a doctor. It is a great program and amazing how many people are not aware they are diabetic. As I am sure you are aware, diabetes is on the rise and leads to many serious health issues. How great would it be to start a program like this one in your community and then watch it grow to Statewide? LCIF has grants available to help with diabetes prevention. If you want to know more, talk to our LCIF Coordinator, Carolyn Brook. Her contact information is in the directory. Speaking of District directories, did all club presidents, treasurers and secretaries get their directories? If not, let me know and I will track down yours. I also have a few extras to sell for \$5 if anyone needs an extra one. I like to talk a lot about service projects, projects you currently do and challenging you to think outside the box for new ones. I learned about a service project that the Lorain Lions have implemented that I want to share with you. Build a Bed. They build beds for kids that do not have beds to sleep in. They have built more than 1100 beds. That is great and so sad at the same time. Things that we took for granted as kids—beds, regular meals, even shoes without holes, are things that many kids experience on a daily basis. Where are the parents, relatives, community? As a Lion, we sometimes are tired, burnt out in what we do, but think what would NOT happen in our communities, especially for kids, if we decided to just write checks and not roll up our sleeves and build beds, fill back packs with food, gather school supplies, complete a clothing drive, donate legos to the children's cancer units, and the list goes on. Our communities need us and we always rise up to serve when we see that need. It's what we do. We serve! I want to send a special thank you to Old Fort Lions who not only allowed me to participate in their fish fry with Lake Erie perch and walleye, but presented me with a beautiful bouquet of flowers and a gas card to help defray the costs of traveling about the District.

That was very thoughtful and generous. Thank you for allowing me to be your District Governor and lead OH2.

District Poinsettia Sale - 2024

The District poinsettia sale is here. Money raised helps to fund a number of district expenses. Your club support is much appreciated. It makes a great club fund raiser, too. 22 district clubs participated in the 2023 District OH2 poinsettia sale, selling 1032 poinsettias and putting about \$2800 into the District Poinsettia Fund. Some clubs also added money to their treasuries. District pricing will be: \$9.00 for the 6-1/2" poinsettias and \$17.00 for the 8-1/2" poinsettias. Red, white, pink, marbled and Jinglebell (red with white spots) are available in both sizes. The 8-1/2" pots contain three plants of the same color - and there also is a tri-color 8-1/2"pot which contains three plants in combinations of the above colors. Poinsettias will be available for pick up at Pinehaven beginning the Monday, November 16. Larger orders may be scheduled for delivery. Contact past customers to remind them that you will be happy to take their orders. Reaching out to new customers is a great way to add sales.

 Companies may file a request for extension online on the division's website, <u>UnclaimedFunds.Ohio.Gov</u>. Extensions must be filed by Nov.1, and life insurance companies must filed by May 1. If you are uncertain if you need to file an extension, or are expecting to make corrections to your report, please file an extension. If you are uncertain how long of an extension you need, we recommend filing an extension for 120 days.
