I have visited five clubs in the last month presenting programs about LCIF. Part of my job is to educate the membership about LCIF grants and what LCIF does for our communities and the world. I will be contacting clubs in the near future to schedule a visit.

LCIF awarded 13 grants totaling \$365,000, 11 districts grants totaling have received Emergency grants totaling \$165,000. Also 2 Major Catastrophe grants awarded to MD 35 and MD 31 of \$100,000 each. These grants were for North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Georgia, and Florida.

All of these grants totaled \$5,263,600.00. Our donations do so much for those in need. I was told there will probably be more grants awarded.

I thank all of the clubs and members that have donated, but to reach the goal of \$49,956.00 much more needs to be donated. The district has donated a total of \$14,665.00. We need to donate a total of \$35,291.00 to me our goal by June 30, 2024. I every club donates \$30.50 per member will reach that goal. Remember this money goes for all of programs that help so many and so many programs.




#### **Perrysville Lions**

In the 4<sup>th</sup> year, they tend to settle down and procreate. If a seagull lives past its first year or two, it has a good chance of living 15-20 years. Seagulls are important to the environment because they help keep things clean via their scavenging eating habits.
