It is hard to believe that we are already past the halfway point of the Lions Year. Time is passing fast. As of the end of January, membership is down by -10. We are growing but we keep losing members at a faster rate than we can replace them. We gained seventy new members, plus 6 transfers since July, but we have lost 86. For Lion's Year 2024-2025, the District continues with 53 Clubs with 1,634 current members. The good news is that eight new members were recently inducted for Polk Lions; Bucyrus Lions are inducting five new members, and Fremont Lions inducted two new members. I am sure there are some more new members out there that I do not know about. Keep up the good work of growing our District.

I have attended all three of the Growth Workshops and meet regularly with my GAT Team to strategize on growing our existing Clubs and building new clubs. Our District GAT and GET Teams are continuing to build a new club in Carey, Ohio. We are also pursuing a Club Branch in Green Springs and New London areas. We are laying the foundation, have our game plans in place each of these locations. We are also exploring two specialty clubs-one will focus on diabetes and the other one is a unique "digital" club that involves bringing young people into a club that does not have borders in a community but widespread membership throughout the district itself. Our District is working on two new Leo Clubs. Bucyrus Leos is close to chartering and Clear Fork is searching for an advisor.

Please plan a membership night in March or April. A suggestion is to plan a dinner and invite guests to attend. Let the conversation focus on what they want to see happen in their community and then talk about how, together, you can plan a project would help meet that need. Sometimes it just takes an invitation for a person to become a Lion.

Our Pediatric Cancer committee has coordinated many STEPS walks in the fall, with many clubs now organizing their own in their communities. The goal for our District is \$20,000 and we are up to \$18,000 already. We have helped six families in our District as of today.

Our Zone Chairs are 100% trained and our club officers are 51% trained. Our Marketing and Communication Coordinator, Tresa Hess, is reaching out to all clubs to assist with establishing a Facebook page, if they do not have one already, and teaching them how to utilize it for marketing their club. If your club would like help to set up a facebook page, contact Tresa Hess. She is in the District Directory under marketing and communications.

Our service reporting is at 74%. If your club has not reported service on the portal, please do so. If you need help, please contact Debbie Reidy, our District Administrator and she can assist you.

And last, I am working with my convention co-chairs on planning for the 2025 convention. Events at the convention include a Masked Lion Singer contest, a Euchre Tournament, the Silent Auction, an Amazing Duck Race and a performance by Elwood and Jake, the Almost Blues Brothers. Action photos from Lions Clubs throughout our district will be displayed on a big screen during the luncheon and grand banquet. Send your photos, get registered, create your silent auction basket, purchase your duck for the amazing duck race and send in bedding for twin beds to help with the Build a Bed projects in our district that build beds for kids who have no bed to sleep in. I hope to see you all there.

A More Vibrant World

A Life Scout belonging to Scouting Troop 444 out of Tiffin, Patrick Heckler, has set his sights on enabling a more vibrant world. His goal for his Eagle Scout Project is to place special viewers in parks that allow color-blind individuals to see the beauty of nature. Color blindness is a disability that affects 1 in 12 men and around 1 in 200 women around the world. That means that this disability affects around 2,000 men and around 150 women in Seneca County alone. Being color-blind himself, Patrick is determined to help the color-blind population of Seneca County witness the true vibrant colors of the world for the first time. The viewers are manufactured by SeaCoast Manufacturing and contain specialized lenses created by EnChroma Inc. The initial goal is to purchase and place two viewers in Seneca County Parks. One at Steyer Nature Preserve and another at Clinton Park. If funding is available, additional viewers will appear across Seneca County. Patrick's goal is to raise \$7,000 to cover the projected costs. If you wish to donate to help Patrick reach his goal, any monetary donations are accepted. It is a business that helps 80% of the blind and vision impaired to become independent. They make highlighters and binders. Envision began in the 1930's with a training school. The money they make is used to help train those who are losing their vision. It gives them a pathway to independence. Many items are manufactured. The military and the government are their main customers.

The DALLAS WHITEHOUSE gives mobility training and skills on the computer. In the PRIDE program they can pursue their own goals. They train on devices and continue to do what they love. They are in 18 locations in several states.

Lion Keith could observe these individuals and said they move slower but it's humbling to know how well they work. It was a good experience for him. They work at call centers and can talk on the phone and read braille on their computer.

The TITAN'S TEAM has five areas: 1. to learn, 2. to observe, 3. Find solutions, 4. implement, 5. celebrate their success.

With TAK TIME they make a binder every minute and Keith passed one around for us to see how nice they are. His team figured a more convenient way for them to work and set it up so all would be more orderly. The area is in a U shape. They are on 16-18 military bases. Envision is constantly fundraising so they can help more visually impaired.

March 1 is a pancake breakfast for Blane Young who has cancer from 9-11 at Loudonville put on by Loudonville and Perrysville clubs.

We are to sell 50/50 tickets and help them. Our March 5 Hayesville club retirees lunch is at The Mill at 12:00. March 18 is the Three Score and Ten Banquet. If you can help serve come at 5:30.

March 20 is our next business meeting at 6 pm with dinner served at 7 pm at Hayesville Methodist Church.


