There have been many updates in the park through the years including flagpoles, electrical work, benches, and the arch with the name in 2012. Much of the work has been done by Masonry Construction with monetary aid

from the Ottawa County Community Foundation and the Harry Stensen Memorial Fund. OTTAWA COUNTY COMMUNITY DAY: The Ottawa County Community Day was held on May 3rd. Lions were there doing vision screenings, providing information about the Club, and handing out plush toys to children. Fifty-nine screenings were done and the plush toys were a BIG HIT! The toys came to us courtesy of Cedar Point. ADULT PROTECTIVE SERVICES: The Club was recently addressed by Ms. Julie McKitrick of the Ottawa County Dept. of Job & Family Services concerning its Adult Protective Services program. This program seeks to protect seniors from various kinds of abuse; physical, emotional & psychological. There has been an upturn in cases reported in recent years. Seniors are vulnerable to various phishing and financial types of scams. Ms. McKitrick emphasizes that folks must be able to voluntarily accept services. Dignity of the individual is key. She stresses the importance of having a durable Power of Attorney; someone to be involved in medical and financial matters on behalf of an older adult. Referrals to Adult Protective Services can be made via law enforcement and other community social services. The program may also be contacted directly. There are offices all around the State of Ohio.




