Ohio Lions Celebrate Centennial of Helen Keller's "Knights of the Blind" Speech at 2025 State Convention

**Lorain, Ohio – May 19, 2025** – The Ohio Lions gathered at Sawmill Creek Resort in Huron, Ohio, from May 16 to 18, 2025, to commemorate the 100th anniversary of Helen Keller's historic "Knights of the Blind" speech. This pivotal moment in Lions Clubs International history continues to inspire the organization's dedication to vision-related causes.

The convention featured a range of events, including workshops, fellowship activities, and a special celebration held at Cedar Point, titled "Celebrating 100 years of our Lions Mission, Knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness."

In 1925, Cedar Point hosted the 9th annual International Convention of Lions Clubs, where Helen Keller delivered a powerful speech urging Lions to become "Knights of the Blind." Subsequently, a motion was made and unanimously voted upon to accept that mission. This convention was a significant event in the Lions movement's history, launching an international effort to prevent blindness and promote eye care.

This weekend's special celebration, held at Cedar Point, was a stage production titled "A Voice for Change" presented at same convention hall, where on June 30, 1925, Helen Keller made a plea to support her \$2 million endowment fund drive for the benefit of the American Foundation for the Blind.

The production portrayed the life of Hellen Keller from an early age showing her struggles to overcome the loss of sight and hearing at 19 months old and included a reenactment of her inspirational plea to ask those who could see to help those with sight challenges.

The celebration included a keynote address by Immediate Past International President Patti Hill along with Past International President Frank Moore who shared their insights into the Lions' ongoing global vision impact and the enduring legacy of Keller's speech.

Douglas Krucinski, 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President of Lorain Lions Club attended the convention and said, "I thoroughly enjoyed the presentation that the actors gave illustrating Helen Keller's life. I was especially moved at the reenactment speech that Helen Keller originally presented at the 1925 Lions International Convention. Today, Lions worldwide continue to follow the vision that Helen Keller presented 100 years ago."

Also, the Sandusky Lions Club was honored for their 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary year of Lion service, having received their charter on May 7<sup>th</sup>, 1925. Proclamations were presented to the Sandusky Lions Club from the Office of Ohio Governor Mike DeWine, U. S. Representative Marcy Kaptur, U. S. Senator Bernie Moreno, Erie County Commissioner Stephen Shaffer and Sandusky City Manager, John Orzech.

The Ohio Lions State Convention serves as a testament to the organization's commitment to service and community engagement. Looking ahead, Lions Clubs across Ohio will continue to honor Keller's vision by supporting initiatives that enhance the lives of those with vision impairments and other challenges.
