### **District Committee's Information**



Here we are starting the second quarter of our Lions year. I was in Atlanta, Georgia with the other LCIF District Coordinators September 5 thru September 8 for more training on LCIF. I learned more about grants and what I can do to help clubs get grants. This year our District's goal is \$54,056.00. This means that if every

member donated \$34.00 we would meet our goal. To receive the "Horst Herzog Award" the club average donation must equal \$34.00 per member.

I thank every club and member that donated to the LCIF Disaster Fun for the terrible floods in Texas. I am proud to report that our District donated a little over \$5000.00 to this fund. Every dollar that is donated is used to help those in need and that dollar goes a long way.

I am glad to report that the Lorain Lions Club's grant to repair and update a basket court for a park was approved by LCIF.

Remember, each club that donates a total of \$5000.00 in a Lions year will receive 15%, which would be \$750.00 you can use for a District Community Grant. Funds donated to the restricted fund, Disaster Fund does not go toward to the DCG. I would love to see several clubs meet this so they can get funds for a grant to help their community.

### 2025 District 13 OH-2 Poinsettia Sale Information:

Pricing, colors and sizes in 2025 are same as last year: \$9 for the 6-1/2" poinsettias and \$17 for the 8-1/2" poinsettias. To receive Lion's pricing, ALL orders must be placed through a Lions or Leo Club. Multiple orders can be placed designating different pick up dates. Mail or email orders to Lion Ann Miller who will coordinate with Pinehaven Garden Center and Cabinet Treasurer Lion Tom Frasz. Place all orders to schedule pick ups by December 20.

Clubs may schedule flower pick-ups beginning November 17. Pinehaven will have a copy of your club order to match the copy you bring. Club needs to coordinate pick-up time directly with them. If making several pick-ups, you will need to have a completed order form for each one. It is too confusing to attempt to pick up "split" orders.

Clubs pay **no** money directly to Pinehaven. They bill the District for total sales. CT Lion Tom has copies of all club orders. Make club checks to DISTRICT 13 OH-2 POINSETTIA SALE. Send check to Lion Ann with your club order, or if paying after delivery, send check and a copy of club order to CT Lion Tom. Lion Ann will coordinate all club orders with Pinehaven and will forward all checks received to CT Lion Tom.

Clubs are to forward to District 13 OH-2: \$9.00 for each 6-1/2" poinsettia sold and \$17.00 for each 8-1/2" poinsettia sold. Money goes into the Poinsettia Sale account from which a number of District projects and activities are funded. Pinehaven will schedule a delivery to your club with a minimum order of \$250. Delivery cost is extra and this charge IS direct responsibility of the club to Pinehaven Garden Center and is to be paid with the delivery.

If your club is also using this poinsettia sale as a fund raising activity, you may want to create your own order form using the pricing you have established. Thank you for your support.

The Lorain Lions Club annual STEPS walk to end pediatric cancer, held on September 27th.




