There were approximately 50 Lions in attendance. It was a wonderful meeting.



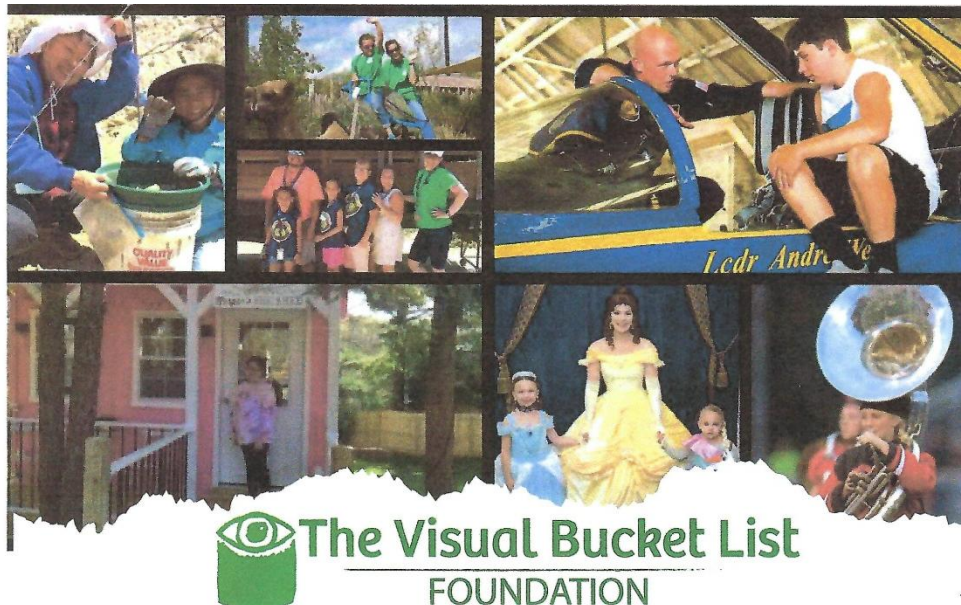

Pediatric Cancer Fundraiser – September Childhood Cancer Awareness Month

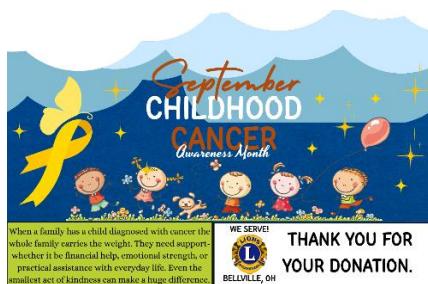

Looking ahead, we will be holding our annual Spook Alley

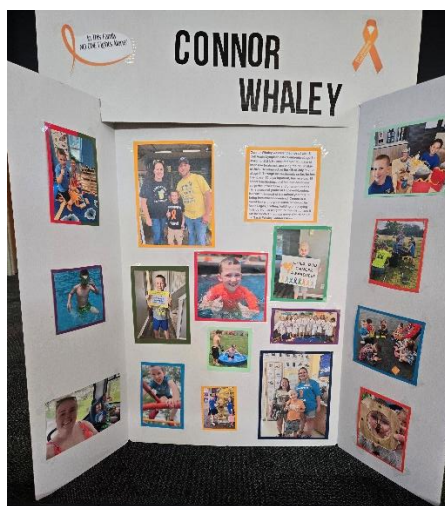
for the Col. Crawford kids ages 0-5th grade at the Col. Crawford High School gymnasium on Thursday, October 30th.

Lucas Lions Club

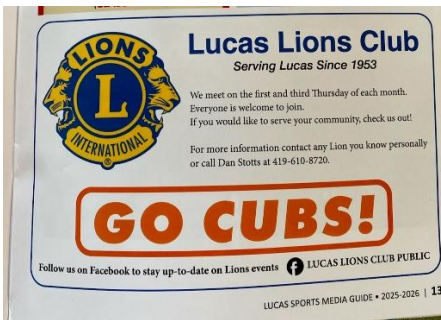
