of our club and will be missed.

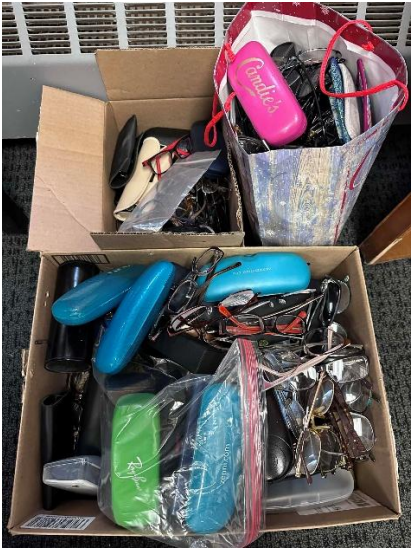


Lucas Lions Club

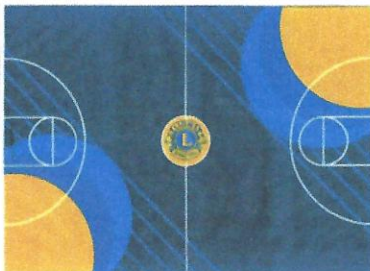
